



Students who apply to these out-of-province universities can authorize the universities to request their academic information from the OUAC. To authorize them, the applicant must include their 11-digit OUAC Reference Number on the university's application form.

In all cases, the 11th digit should be "0".

This automated transfer of academic data greatly reduces the workload for high schools by eliminating the need to prepare and mail hard-copy transcripts.



# UNIVERSITY REQUIREMENTS


- Graduate from High School (OSSD)
- Complete 18 compulsory credits + 12 optional credits
- Pass/complete OSSLT/OSSLC
- Online learning requirement (or Opt-Out Form)
- Submit 40 community involvement hours (10 hours can be from a paid job before Aug 31/23)
- Minimum 6 Gr. 12 "U" or "M" courses (almost all programs require ENG4U1)
- Successfully complete the prerequisites for your university program choices
- Meet admission average requirement



# UNIVERSITY REQUIREMENTS

- How does the university calculate admission averages?
- When are the deadlines for additional admission criteria, if required?
- What are their policies regarding repeat courses?
  - (U of Waterloo/U of Toronto program specific)
- How do they look at summer school/night school/private school courses? (U of Waterloo - program specific)
- Do they make alternate offers of admission?







# UNIVERSITY REQUIREMENTS

- Choose programs that are within your range of expected marks: "Reach, Range, Safety".
- Ensure that you will have the necessary courses and average to be considered for admission
- Complete any additional admission criteria (auditions/portfolios/PSE)
- Be realistic and study hard!
- Gr. 11 marks are increasingly important!



# ENGLISH LANGUAGE LEARNERS

- Contact universities to see if you need to write an English proficiency test.
- Check individual school websites to see which tests are accepted for admissions.
- If you have studied 4 years in an English language high school, you are usually exempt.

# UNIVERSITY APPLICATION SEMINAR

- Sign up NOW through your Guidance Google Classroom by Fri. Sept. 29
- DDSB transmits all grade 11 and any grade 12 final marks (full disclosure), plus currently scheduled courses
- Every Ontario university-bound student must attend a session either Monday October 16 during period 1 or 3, OR Tuesday October 17 during period 2 or 4. If you have a spare this semester, please sign up to attend during your spare.
- Deadline for OUAC applications & fees Jan. 15, 2024, if you are applying for a degree program at a college, OCAS applications are due February 1, 2024
- Some early offers of admission can begin shortly after students apply
- NOTE some university programs/scholarships may require an earlier submission date for the application, please be aware of these deadlines.





#### Fees for OUAC:

- \$156.00 for three choices
- \$50.00 for each additional choice
- \$10 International service fee if the applicant is not a Canadian citizen or permanent resident
- Some programs may have supplemental fees for specific programs

#### 4. Supplemental Program Fee



Supplemental program fees cover the cost of individual faculty admission processes. The supplemental program
fee is non-refundable and you pay it along with your OUAC application fee.

- Offers of Admission (November May)
- Universities may request additional information after you apply (auditions/portfolios/PSE/interviews)
- You are responsible for meeting all deadlines
- Read all correspondences carefully
- Some university programs will send out earlier offers than others
- All offers are conditional

# UNIVERSITY APPLICATIONS

- Final marks will be sent to OUAC by the DDSB at designated times throughout the school year:
  - Semester 1 midterm Nov 16/23
  - Semester 1 final Feb 14/24
  - Semester 2 midterm -April 24/24
  - Semester 2 final July 3/24
- Conditional offers of admission continue as marks are updated during the year





- May 29, 2024 The latest date by which all secondary school applicants shall expect a response from an Ontario university
- Such a response will be one of:
  - 1) an offer of admission
  - 2) a refusal; or
  - 3) a deferral pending the receipt of specific additional information
- Offers of admission include any scholarships/financial assistance and residence information
- If you are not admitted into any of your program choices, you can begin to search for other program vacancies through OUAC's "Admission Information Service"
- June 3, 2024 Earliest date by which Ontario universities may require a response to an offer of admission and any financial commitment


# ACADEMIC TERMS

# DIRECT-ENTRY PROGRAM

- Entry to university with high school credentials
- Requires specific high school courses/prerequisites

# UNDERGRADUATE PROGRAM

- Minimum GPA/academic progress required to continue to 2nd year of degree
- If minimum academic progress is not met, student may be placed on academic probation



  - B.B.A. Bachelor of Business Administration
  - B.F.A. Bachelor of Fine Arts etc...






# ACADEMIC TERMS

#### SECOND-ENTRY PROGRAM

- Requires prior university courses (or a completed degree) to be considered for entry
- Will often lead to a Graduate Degree
  - e.g., Medicine, Law, Veterinarian, Consecutive Education, MBA, Physiotherapy, Dentistry, MPA, Masters of...





#### ACADEMIC YEAR IN UNIVERSITY


- Two terms (fall and winter terms)
- Summer term is also available
- 10 semester or 5 full year courses/year
- Some programs may require more (Engineering)

### GENERAL BACHELOR'S DEGREE: 3 years

30 semester/15 full year courses

### HONOUR BACHELOR'S DEGREE: 4 years

40 semester/ 20 full year courses





#### **SPECIALIST**

Highly-concentrated area of study in a degree

#### **MAJOR**






#### **FACULTIES**


- Comprehensive branches of learning at a university
- Faculty of Fine Arts, Faculty of Science,

- Concurrent vs. Consecutive

- Primary/Junior, Junior/Intermediate, Intermediate/Senior




#### CO-OPERATIVE EDUCATION

- Work terms alternate with school terms
- Earn money in your area of study
- Summer sessions often involved
- May extend length of your degree



### **INTERNSHIP**

- Provides students with a 12-16 month work experience
- Can be paid or unpaid depending on the program. They are professionally supervised, career-related positions designed to offer second- or third-year students the opportunity to learn about current advances, practices and technologies in their area of study
- Can extend the length of time to complete your degree









#### PREPARE A BUDGET

- University costs \$10,000-\$30,000+ /year
- Different tuition for different programs
- Take ownership of your education plan
- Ensure resources are in place before next
   September
- Talk candidly to family regarding financial commitments
- Create a formal budget resources and expenses



#### **COSTS TO INCLUDE IN YOUR BUDGET:**

- Tuition and student fees
- Books/course materials
- Computer/printer/supplies
- Health Insurance
- Living expenses on/off campus (internet, cell phone, utilities)
- Food costs
- Transportation/Parking/Travel
- Entertainment costs
- Clothing and incidentals



This new grant provides funding for students studying in priority geographical areas in need of nurses in Ontario.

Provides: free tuition, compulsory school fees, books and other direct educational costs such as supplies and equipment

You must fulfill a service commitment after you graduate to receive this grant. This includes working in the same service region of the province where you studied for 6 months for every full year of study funded by the grant. For example, a Bachelor of Science in Nursing is 4 years long and you received funding for all 4 years, you must work in that same region for 2 years after your graduation. Your funding will be converted to a repayable loan if you do not meet all required conditions, including meeting the service requirement.

To be eligible for this grant, you must apply through OSAP website and must also be offered admission into a participating college or university.

### Ontario Learn and Stay Grant



### **RESP - Canada Education Savings Grant**

- Grant of 20% on every dollar of the first \$2,500 you save in your child's RESP each year.
- Grant-eligible contribution room, up to age of 17
- \$7,200 Lifetime grant limit per beneficiary
- If you contribute \$2,500 every year, you will hit the maximum grant level in the fifteenth year





### **SELF-FINANCING**

- Employment
- Part-time work
- Summer employment
- Co-op and internships



### **BANK OF FAMILY?**

- Free room and board
- Use of family vehicle
- Registered Education Savings Plan (RESP)
- Assistance with educational costs (e.g., tuition, books, rent, care packages)
- Co-signing student line of credit



### ONTARIO STUDENT ASSISTANCE PROGRAM (OSAP)

- Provides a combination of grants and loans
- Full time students only minimum 60% course load (Students with a permanent disability - 40% course load)
- "Consent & Declaration" forms must be signed by parent(s)/guardian(s) and student and sent to the Financial Aid office of your Ontario university





# FINANCING YOUR EDUCATION (OSAP)

You can start the application process for OSAP when you apply to Ontario universities - OSAP/OUAC Net Tuition Billing

- OSAP is available for approved out-ofprovince schools in Canada (see OSAP website for details)
- Canada-Ontario Integrated Student Loan (COISL) is available for approved out-ofcountry schools
- Complete the application in late May/June





# FINANCING YOUR EDUCATION (OSAP)

- OSAP is divided into 2 installments:
  - Semester 1 60%, Semester 2 40%
- Academic progress is required
- Work/Study programs
- You will need to apply for each academic year
- OSAP will not cover all the costs of your education

- Your gross income and 2023 income tax information (if you were employed)





GRANTS: non-repayable (YEAH!)

LOANS: must be repaid

- You can accept the grants and decline the loans from OSAP
- OSAP applications open for the next academic year in the late spring - apply every year you are in university





### **BURSARIES**

- Based on financial need
- Ability to pay for education is the main consideration
- Applications and financial statements are required



### **SCHOLARSHIPS**

- Based on academic achievement and/or community involvement/leadership
- Search out scholarships available from: universities / corporations / private organizations / non-profits / high school commencement

GRADES-BASED UNIVERSITY ENTRANCE SCHOLARSHIPS

- No separate application required
- Based solely on entrance mark averages (80% +)
- Varies depending on university:
  - E.g., Trent University: 95%+ = \$3000 x 4 years = \$12,000, renewable by maintaining an average of 80% or above in 5.0 Trent credits per year
  - University of Ottawa: 95%+ = \$4000 (nonrenewable)







### APPLICATION-BASED UNIVERSITY SCHOLARSHIPS

- Many university scholarship applications are available on-line now
- Some require completed applications early (before acceptance into a program)
- Some require school sponsorship these will be posted in your Guidance Google Classroom and will require timely action on the part of the student to receive the school's sponsorship

### ATHLETIC FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE (AFA)

- Ontario-based program (some other provinces have a similar program)
- Coach recommended
- Max. \$ 4,500 (renewable)
- 80% entrance average required.
