Semester one exams were a success for all students and final report cards were distributed on February 10th in homerooms. 

This semester, 88 students had the opportunity to take part in the Casa Loma trip. Students spent the day exploring the Castle and learning about the history of Toronto during World War I. While visiting, students also got to take part in a Team Challenge Scavenger Hunt and were able to see the Castle 'dressed up' for the haunted Halloween event.

World War I comes to Life!

Students had the opportunity to explore World War I artifacts during a hands-on activity in the classroom. The artifacts, on loan from the Canadian War Museum allowed students to explore real and replica items from World War I. Items included a helmet, nursing apron, gas rattle, officer's uniform, maps and shrapnel. Students had a great time making predictions and drawing conclusions about how items were used.

Lacrosse Workshop - October 23rd



We are so proud of the student's hard work, efforts and passion for mathematics. More contests are scheduled in February and April so we encourage even more students to participate. Interested students should talk to their math teacher or see Ms. Fu or Mrs. Kos in the math office.

Ms. Fu's grade 10 and 11 Enriched Math classes experimented with motion sensors discovering and implementing numerous mathematical applications. They also created a user manual affectionately titled, "The Dummies Guide to Using Motion Sensors." Fantastic effort and results.

The grade 9 math classes have also been using these SONAR based motion sensors to explore motion graphs. It was great to make connections between information provided by a graph and the physical activity that was happening in real-time. Next steps involve using these motion sensors to run exploration based learning activities to model both linear and quadratic relationships. Authentic learning has never been so much fun!





Stress Management

Its Ok To Ask For Help

Stress is real and it impacts all of us differently. Its important to know what is causing us stress and how to manage it.

Both students and teachers go through stress.



A certain amount of stress is normal and desirable. It is by learning to handle the little difficulties that we are able to develop the strength and coping skills to take on the bigger challenges. Here are some of the factors to consider:

- **Know Thyself:** Identify what triggers stress. Write a list of the things that make you feel pressured or upset.
- **Identify Stress:** Identify changes in your body and emotions for example changes in vision, breathing, rapid heart beat, tense muscles, feeling sad, frustrated, irritated, angry or being hyper-sensitive.
- **Rest:** Consider your diet and sleep. Eating healthy and getting a restful sleep. Five of fewer hours of sleep can lead to health problems. Take breaks if you have to.
- **Prioritize:** To avoid feeling overwhelmed, prioritize your time. By taking on too much can create unnecessary stress and health problems and you may not be able to finish everything on time.


Student Success

Maha Shivaratri Day February 21st
