### Principals Message

September 2019 Newsletter

Welcome back to a new school year parents, caregivers, and students.

This past summer we had some upgrades to our facility which have added a warm and inviting atmosphere to the front foyer of the school and courtyard. The exterior cladding was upgraded to a concrete finish and the courtyard stones were replaced with stamped concrete with a high-quality finish. The windows along the east and north sides of the courtyard were replaced with high efficiency glass and stainless finish providing better insulation and increased light into those areas. Finally, the tiles of the main foyer were replaced with new tile and a ramp for accessibility.

We have been off the ground and running quickly this year. We have had some changes and additions to our staff as a result of increases and shifts in our overall enrollment. Our current population is approximately 1200 students. We continue our focus this year in the following areas: 1) equity and inclusion, specifically integrating relevant and responsive classroom practices that support engagement and achievement in the classroom; 2) creating classroom communities that are safe, welcoming and support well-being of our students; and 3) differentiated assessment practices that are personalized to the individual learning needs of students across the grades and disciplines. I encourage you to review the student agenda and our website for the highlights of our common commitments which guide our overall school improvement.

Connection between school and home is increasingly important for student success in secondary school. Speak with your teenager often about what is happening during classroom instruction. This year with ubiquitous access to technology due to the inclusion of Chromebooks from Grades 9 to 12, the window into the classroom is clearer with access to software tools in G-Suite, Google classroom, and Desire-2-Learn. This is a great way to fully engage in what is happening during the learning cycle rather than at midterm and end of semester.



We look forward to engaging in another fantastic year of success and growth together!





### Self-Care

Taking care of oneself is a **crucial** and **necessary** ingredient for those who care for others. This is especially true of those working in education. Self-care is just like the oxygen mask on a plane. We need to place it on ourselves before we can help others.

As the school year winds down, and educators are looking forward to the summer break, its timely to offer a reminder to focus on your own well-being. Consider this your invitation to build into your daily practise the basics of your self-care.

### PERSONAL RESILIENCY



### THE BASICS OF SELF-CARE

EAT We all need to refuel. If we are under a lot of stress, be mindful of the foods you choose. Also, keep a healthy snack close by so that you can refuel easily and avoid being "Hangry".

SLEEP Aim to get seven to nine hours of sleep each night. Research has shown that getting five hours or less of sleep a night can create health problems. Getting enough sleep also helps you to better deal with the stresses of everyday life.

DRINK A lot of water and consider decreasing or discontinuing your caffeine intake as the latter creates a stress reaction in your body and can cause you to feel nervous or contribute to sleeping difficulties.
 MOVE The positive effects of being physically active are astounding. It increases your energy, enhances your immune

system, reduces insomnia, stimulates brain growth, and even acts as an anti-depressant. You can achieve these benefits by as little as a 30-minute walk. Endorphin production following physical activity is nature's gift to you for stress management!

CONNECT Strong social connections are one of the most powerful influences on our mood. Those who are dedicated to spending time with friends, and family show the highest levels of happiness. If you can't see your loved ones every day, you can still send an email or make a phone call.

PAUSE Make sure to take time for yourself during the day, to listen to music, take a few deep breaths, meditate, write in a gratitude journal, do a few stretches, take a brisk walk or do some other activity that helps you feel restored.

ACKNOWLEDGE

Be mindful of your thoughts and feelings, both positive and negative, as part of your self-care.

Finding a healthy outlet (see some suggestions below) to process your emotions and self-talk can lead to optimal self-care practices.

REFLECT Take time to reflect on what is important to you both personally and professionally. Your values and sense of purpose help you focus on what is meaningful for you. Taking time to reflect can assist you to intentionally and systemically make decisions in your life.

REPEAT Research has shown that trying a new skill/habit/routine for 21 days in a row will increase the likelihood of maintaining this new practice. It is recommended having an accountability partner during those first few weeks; it's a helpful strategy to enhance your success rate of maintaining your new practice.

### Ally Week 2019 is September 23-27

GLSEN's Ally Week is a student-led program where LGBTQ K-12 students and LGBTQ educators lead the conversation on what they need from their allies in school.



### Franco-Ontarian Day: September 25.

The Province of Ontario officially recognizes September 25th of each year as Franco — Ontarian Day as well as the "contribution of the Francophone community of Ontario to the social, economic and political life of the Province and the community's importance in Ontario's society".



September 30th Orange Shirt Day is a legacy of the St. Joseph Mission (SJM) residential school commemoration event held in Williams Lake, BC, Canada, in the spring of 2013. It grew out of Phyllis' account of having her shiny new orange shirt taken away on her first day of school at the Mission, and it has become an opportunity to keep the discussion on all aspects of residential schools happening annually. The date was chosen because it is the time of year in which children were taken from their homes to residential



schools, and because it is an opportunity to set the stage for the continued creation of a safe, equitable and inclusive school environment as the school year begins. Orange Shirt Day is also an opportunity for First Nations, local governments, schools and communities to come together in the spirit of reconciliation and hope for generations of children to come.

### October 11—International Day of the Girl

Every year on 11 October, the International Day of the Girl, UNICEF works with girls to amplify their voices and stand up for their rights. This year, under the theme, "GirlForce: Unscripted and unstoppable", we will celebrate achievements by, with and for girls since the adoption of the Beijing Declaration and Platform for Action.

In nearly 25 years, we have seen more girls move from dreaming to achieving. More girls today are attending and completing school, fewer are getting married or becoming mothers while still children, and more are gaining the skills they need to excel in the future world of work.



Girls are breaking boundaries and barriers posed by stereotypes and exclusion, including those directed at children with disabilities and those living in marginalized communities.
