PHONE USE IN SCHOOL

Summary of Ajax High School Phone Policy:

- Phones are expected to be out of sight during class time.
 Teachers may invite students to use their phones for instructional purposes.
- It is expected that students utilize phones for instructional purposes if invited to have them out.
- Teachers have the authority to confiscate the phone from the student if repeated requests to put it away are ignored.
- Phones can be taken to an administrator if a teacher feels it is necessary.





THE CHROMEBOOK, GOOGLE CLASSROOM, AND D2L



- Each student is loaned a Chromebook for educational use while they are a student with the DDSB that must be returned upon graduation or if you move out of the DDSB boundary.
- Teachers may use Google Classroom and/or D2L Brightspace as an instructional tool for assignments, online discussions, and virtual lessons.
